Curriculum is prescribed by Kumaun University Nainital and followed by our institution. Salient feature of curriculum (ex-academic course etc.) is published each year in college brochure which is provided to students along with the admission forms. Faculty members also play crucial roles in imparting curriculum to students. Faculty wise and departmental time tables are prepared at the beginning of new session of semesters and periods are allocated every year to ensure effective delivery of curriculum. Some senior teachers are also BOS members at university level. The college has practiced a curriculum design model by considering the best of the features of the models like the reputed universities and colleges recommended course composite structure. In science faculty, besides theoretical segment, more than 50% courses are having practical based on lab components. Several courses requiring scientific tools / accessories have also been run successfully in the interest of the learners. Teacher training programme is imparted through self financed, B.ED courses in our college. During the implementation of all educational processes ITC is used quite effectively. Most of the departments have been provided computer system with high speed internet connection. The teachers use projectors in the processes of imparting education so that the students could take more interest.

Some of the students in college belong to the marginalised sections of society. Lack of resources and previous knowledge hinders them to accomplish to the fullest of their capacity. Coaching classes were started to fulfil needs of students from such sections of society e.g. SC, ST, OBC etc. 4- The practice: For the above objective coaching classes were run in college for which grants and guidelines were received from the Directorate of Higher Education Uttarakhand. Students belonging to scheduled castes, scheduled tribes and other backward classes and especially able were identified and enrolled for the coaching classes. Classes were conducted either before college time or during vacations. Learned faculty members of college gave lectures on their own subjects and also on topics of current affairs. External experts were also approached and called as resource persons for the classes. 5- Evidence of success: A remarkable number of students attended coaching classes and got benefitted. Later these students appeared for various competitive exams. 6- Problem: • Not many external experts were easily available to take remedial classes. • Irregularity of students due to bad weather and other constraints.
